Jim Harries, chair of the AVM, is to present a paper at this conference, entitled: **Bridging the Culture Gap between Africa and the West in the Light of the Contextuality of Knowledge.** Here is the abstract to his paper: "Language is neither objective, a 'silver bullet', nor capable of carrying all the meaning someone can derive from it. Secular liberalism, in the light of diverse cultural realities, should be seen as one of many rather than 'the' option for humankind. Suggesting these things today is a problematic hot potato, given that the multitudes are happy to be duped. (Not that one wants to reject benefits of modernity.) It follows, that culture gaps (not genetic!) between ethnicities may be large and real, including the gap opened by Western Christendom's historical, determined, and devoted engagement with God's essence. Europeans' proximity to God, having enabled

them to appropriate the role God should play in a society, has opened a 'gap' with African theology, which secular liberalism and formal theological education ignore at their peril, and at peril to the Gospel of Jesus."



Through his decades-long service in Africa, Jim Harries has come to understand how the issues involved in this thinking impact our practices in theological education. His solution? Become "vulnerable" by using only local languages to train people for ministry and living at the local level so that it is clear you have nothing to give but service."



Hosts Michael Horton and Justin Holcomb travel to Nairobi, Kenya, for Sola Media's annual Theo Global Symposium. They are joined by Dr. Frew Tamrat and Dr. Seble Daniel. They discuss the challenges and opportunities in advancing theological education and deepening the church's understanding of the gospel in the region.

Sola is home to White Horse Inn, Core Christianity, Modern Reformation, and Theo Global. Their mission is to serve today's global church by producing resources for reformation grounded in the historic Christian faith. They want to see reformation in hearts, homes, and churches around the world.

This interview of two Ethiopians who are heavily invested into Western-led seminary education, contains some gems of insights for those ready to 'read between the lines'. I believe the latter segment (this part of the total interview: <a href="https://youtu.be/PVB1Z3bG-Uo">https://youtu.be/PVB1Z3bG-Uo</a>), is of particular interest to vulnerable mission, and represents the view of the Ethiopians interviewed; an appeal for theology to be rooted in local contexts.
