Write-up of webinar: 'Learning Over Power: moving beyond cross-cultural competency to cultural humility'.

Debbie Kramlich, currently living in Thailand, and with cross cultural experience in addition of living in Germany and Sweden, gave us a gentle deep dive into 'cultural humility'. We all wear tinted glasses, Debbie reminded us. Thus, we often do not realise the hue through which we interpret the world, wrongly assuming that everyone else sees as we do. Her examples include introduction of steel axes to Australians (more information <a href="here">here</a>), and alcohol consuming Germans, that seems wrong to Americans. We need 'deep listening' to check the biases we bring into a culture, Debbie emphasised to us. (The webinar was planned and presented by the Alliance for Vulnerable Mission together with the 'rethinking forum'.)

# Spirits as Euphemism for 'Envies', Implications for Bible Translation, Learning from Africa

Jim Harries will present this paper at the upcoming Bible Translation Forum that will take place on May 2–3, 2025, at the International Conference Center Karimu (Siegenweg 34, 57299 Burbach).

Abstract: This presentation, researched through 36 years of almost daily interactions with African (especially Luo, Kenyan) people, argues that in African contexts, 'spirits' are euphemisms for 'envies'. It explores how this insight applies to Bible translation, suggesting 'spirit', when not referring to God, could be translated as 'envy.' The article identifies a parallel between this and references to "pneuma" in Christian Scriptures. It also discusses how spirits, though often seen as evil, can be beneficial, similar to how envy, while negative, is essential to social harmony. The piece investigates 'spirits' as outcomes of the evil eye and examines the relationship between spirits and the Holy Spirit, noting fundamental differences in identity and nature between traditional gods and the Godhead, highlighting the profound revelation in Christian Scriptures leading to vastly different life outcomes from those of polytheistic beliefs.




Does the West Want to Learn from Majority World (African) Christians? A Puzzle.

This discussion is still live. Go to this link, to see what others have commented, and to add your own comments: As any one theological statement in the West is correctly understood only through a wide background theological knowledge, the

same applies to Africans' words. Taking Africans' words as if they are a contribution to a Western debate, that needs 'correction' through wider reading in that debate, is to misunderstand the African. .... That this is hardly being engaged, has me question, does the West really want to learn from Majority World (African) Christians and theologians, or are pretences at interest largely a show? If they want to learn, there is a 'library' to read, not of books, but of long-term vulnerable exposure to African contexts. Is even one Westerner engaging this?
